New Board Member Elections — Welcome Jim Hoffmann

At SCRPA's annual board elections in November, James G. Hoffmann was chosen as the newest member of the Board of Directors, Southern California Railway Plaza Association.

Jim was a member of the Orange Empire Railroad Museum from 1965 to the mid-1980s, holding many positions, including Chief Instructor. He also contributed to a number of their manuals. Jim joined the Southern California Scenic Railway Association in 1991, where he assisted with their demonstration railroad operations and was appointed Operating Department Superintendent in 1991. He served as SCSRA president from 1995-96, was appointed to their Board of Directors in 2003, and was elected secretary in 2009, which he continued until the group's dissolution. Jim has been an SCRPA members since 2010 and currently serves as the Fullerton Train Museum's docent training chairman. He will serve for a three-year term on the board of directors.

Movie Night Presents OKLAHOMA!

January 13, 2018 marks SCRPA's first movie night of the New Year. We will begin at 6 PM and the movie will start when we run out of wine, which is sponsored by Mr. Eric Shishima.

Oklahoma! is the first musical written by the team of composer Richard Rodgers and librettist Oscar Hammerstein II. The musical is based on Lynn Riggs' 1931 play, Green Grow the Lilacs. Set in Oklahoma Territory outside the town of Claremore in 1906, it tells the story of cowboy Curly McLain and his romance with farm girl Laurey Williams. A secondary romance concerns cowboy Will Parker and his flirtatious fiancée, Ado Annie.

The 1955 film adaptation starred Gordon MacRae, Shirley Jones (in her film debut), Rod Steiger, Charlotte Greenwood, Gloria Grahame, Gene Nelson, James Whitmore and Eddie Albert. It was the only musical film directed by Fred Zinnemann, and Agnes de Mille choreographed. It was the first feature film photographed in the Todd-AO 70 mm widescreen process.



Starring in the "Kansas City" sequence is a Southern Pacific 1673, a standard gauge 2-6-0 M-4 Mogul built in 1900 by Schenectady Locomotive Works for SP. The locomotive is slightly spruced up for the movie but retain its Southern Pacific style. SP 1673 still exists, resting in the Southern Arizona Transportation Museum in Tucson, Arizona.

Oklahoma! was filmed mainly in Arizona's San Rafael Valley, a vast area along the Mexican border about 30 miles from Rancho Grande, near the town of Nogales.

Halloween Scary Train by Mary Proctor



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SCRPA Honors a "Founding" Member

Longtime train enthusiast George Barlow, 76, has died at his home in Fullerton, after dealing with an extensive battle with cancer.

George was an original member of what is now the Southern California Railway Plaza Association. He grew up in Connecticut, where he and his wife, Beth, met as teenagers. After their marriage, they came to Anaheim, Calif., in 1962, then bought their home in Fullerton in 1964.

George worked for IBM until his retirement at 50. He turned his hobby into a new career, driving the steam locomotive at Knott's Berry Farm and working in the park's train store. Through the years, George was also a member of the Classic Thunderbird Club International, based in Long Beach. When he retired from Knott's he became more involved with the Thunderbird Club.



George also helped form the Fullerton Railway Plaza Association, which began as a weekly coffee klatch at the depot in 1991 and incorporated in 1996. The FRPA renamed itself Southern California Railway Plaza Association in 2009 to more accurately identify its identity in the Los Angeles Basin.

You may ask how this group of rail enthusiasts got together? Fullerton Mayor Bob Root, booked himself onto a Pacific Rail Society fan trip from Los Angeles to Bakersfield, scheduled to be powered by steam locomotive ATSF 3751, then undergoing a wheels-up restoration in San Bernardino.

Root, a longtime rail enthusiast, visited the ATSF 3751 steam locomotive restoration site in early 1991, where he met fellow Fullertonian George Barlow, a volunteer for the San Bernardino Railroad Historical Society, owners of the engine. On the Bakersfield trip, Root, Barlow, and a few other Fullertonians along for the ride, discussed the possibility of housing the 3751 in a shelter at the former Santa Fe depot in Fullerton.

George Barlow, Bob Root and Stan Swanson began informal meetings and, by early 1995, the group's dream had grown to include a larger facility that could capture the valuable part that railroads played in the region's development. Support expanded for the idea, and a city study for the Fullerton Transportation Center area by Arroyo Group consultants included the rail attraction in its analysis.

In 1996, the founding group took the step to formalize the idea and formed Fullerton Railway Plaza Association, Inc. (FRPA), as a 501(c)(3) nonprofit corporation.

FRPA then initiated the idea of holding a community event that would showcase rail-related activities as a form of entertainment and thus validate their belief that the concept would be a viable destination attraction. George Barlow was part of the organizing committee to produce the first "Fullerton Railroad Days" in 1999.

Railroad Operations Committee Update, 4th quarter, 2017

It's been a relatively quiet Fall at the ROC. Work continues on the windows in UP 6101. We have five completed and a sixth one has been removed from the frame to be worked on. According to the window detail team, this one looks to be the hardest so far because of old rain leakage and past attempts to stop that leakage with some kind of mastic. But our guys have become pros at this so they'll be able to handle it.

The only other on-going work is the restoration of the interior of the UP 3252 caboose. The final bench is being worked on. This includes completing the galvanized coal bin that had one end left off. After this bench is finished we will do the walls, then the floors.

One interesting thing that happened just recently was that we were contacted by a couple of students from the Los Angeles City High School of Performing Arts. They want to make a short film in our lounge cars as a senior project. They were awed by the lounge cars and were quite animated by the prospect of filming in them. Whether anything comes of this, we'll see.

The mother of one of them was with them and she also was quite impressed with what we had and what we were doing with them. We asked the mother if the school had any contacts with any of the various studios in Hollywood and she said that they did.

We then asked if they had any contacts in the production design departments that may have contacts with companies that could repair our blinds. As luck would have it her husband is a production designer and she would ask him what he might be able to do. We recently found out that he has a contact at NBC, and has arranged for that person to contact us. This is very exciting for us.

We have no more work parties scheduled until Jan. 6, 2018. It'll be a new, and exciting, year. Come join us if you can. If we could get a few more volunteers, we could tackle two windows at a time and get the job done sooner.

Thank you to all our volunteers for all the work you've put in during 2017.
