





CALIFORNIA MUSEUMS ARE DISAPPEARING, BUT WE CAN SAVE THEM, SAYS OCT 9 SPEAKER

Roger Freely has been interested in historical museums since he was a young boy. The first museum he visited was the Air Museum which was located at the Orange County Airport, now John Wayne Airport. The museum closed in 1980 when the airport expanded. Freely was so interested in museums he made special trips to investigate all that he could locate. History has always been a focal point of his life.

In 2000, Freely received his BS degree in History and looked to museums for employment, including the Los Angeles Maritime Museum, the LA City Fire Dept. Historical Museum, the Queen Mary, the Costa Mesa Historical Society, and the CA Historical Commission. In 2003 he began writing a guide for travelers visiting local museums and historical buildings. During his research for the book, he found that in 2002 there were over 1,400 museums in California. By 2008, more than 200 of those have closed. The theme for this presentation is "We Can Save Our Museums."

HISTORICAL & MODELING COMMITTEE FALL REPORT

The summer months have been a time to build and prepare for winter's railroad shows.

Modeling Activities

Committee members have been meeting most every Tuesday at the home of Harold Benash to work on two additional HO scale historical dioramas depicting Fullerton's rail heritage. Both modules are 8 feet long and feature models of historic Fullerton buildings constructed by Doug Archer. The main theme of each module is one of Doug's beautiful renditions of the Union Pacific's Fullerton Station (pre – Spaghetti Factory) and The Pacific Electric Depot (pre – Spadra Italian Restaurant). Both modules are built to standards compatible with the Orange County Modular Railroaders (OCMR) club layout.

The Union Pacific diorama presents a south view of the Union Pacific tracks that used to parallel Truslow Avenue between Spadra (Harbor) and Highland. Left to right, the historically accurate models depict the Cone Chevrolet OK Used Car Lot that once inhabited the northwest corner of Truslow and Spadra; the Union Pacific station and its wooden loading dock; and Elephant Packing House. A house track (siding) serves both Elephant Packing and the UP station, though modeler's license was required to maintain track position for OCMR's track requirements. Between the mainline tracks and the edge of the module is another packing house cutaway, this time representing the Fullerton Packing House that once stood about midway between Spadra and Highland, between Walnut and the UP tracks. The intricate modeling of this module is amazing and includes stacks of used automobile tires, a gardener mowing a lawn, and many other tiny details. The Union Pacific Depot module is complete and will join the ATSF depot module in this fall and winter series of railroad shows.

Work on the Pacific Electric depot module is just underway with some track already laid. Two interesting features of this diorama will be the old Santa Fe Depot prior to the beginning of construction on the current station and overhead trolley wire over the PE track terminating at Commonwealth. Work nights will continue as time allows with hopes that this display

will be ready for the January 2009 Great Train Expo at Anaheim Convention Center.

HISTORY

HOW THE SANTA FE GOT TO CALIFORNIA

From the driving of the Golden Spike at Promontory, Utah, May 1869, until July 15, 1898, California railroads were mostly controlled by the Central Pacific and Southern Pacific railroads, which were owned by the Big Four: Colis P. Huntington, Leland Stanford, Mark Hopkins and Charles Crocker. There were other small and independent railroads in the Golden State before 1898, but Huntington and his partners constantly fought to keep other transcontinental railroads out.

The Oregon-Washington Railroad and Navigation Company, connecting the UP via the Oregon Short Line, brought Union Pacific track to the west coast, arriving in Portland, Oregon in 1884. The UP announced plans to build south toward California a short time later. The threat of Union Pacific invading from the north made it incumbent upon the Big Four to hold California against all comers.

In Southern California there were only two probable routes across the Colorado River—The Needles and Fort Yuma. Huntington and his cronies felt reasonably sure they could hold off the invaders from the east if

they could control these crossings. SP built east from Los Angeles to Yuma, crossing the Colorado River in 1877 and continued building east, even though their charter ended at the California state line. SP reached El Paso, TX, in 1881 and felt they had one of the gateways blocked.

But the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe Railroad was quietly purchasing bits and pieces of bankrupt railroads here and there, and building new track when necessary to connect its purchases. Santa Fe was steadily but quietly creeping west from Kansas.

Railroads had their own private armies to help them "tussle" when necessary. A particularly ugly fight between the Santa Fe "army" and track gangs of the Denver and Rio Grande went Santa Fe's way, gaining the important Raton Pass over the Sangre de Cristo Mountains near Santa Fe, NM.

In 1880, Santa Fe reached Albuquerque and Deming and built a branch down to El Paso, TX, connecting with the Southern Pacific at Deming, NM.

Meanwhile, the Atlantic and Pacific Railroad had been issued land grants, as had the Southern Pacific, with government approval for the two railroads to meet at The Needles, on the California/Arizona border. Through several failures, bankruptcies and acquisitions, the A&P fought its way west. The panic of 1873 was too much and the bankrupt A&P was purchased by the Santa Fe (50%), Southern Pacific (25%) and Union Pacific (25%). While the A&P, now controlled by Santa Fe, continued west, the Southern Pacific was building east from Mojave, CA, to Needles. The two railroads met at the Colorado River on August 9, 1883. SP held their ground on the California side with Santa Fe staring at them from the other bank. Nobody budged.

By late summer 1884, both sides were tired of just looking at each other. The SP and the A&P, now known as the Saint Louis & San Francisco (Frisco), struck a deal whereas Frisco would lease the SP line between Needles and Mojave. With the agreement in hand, Santa Fe could operate from Albuquerque to Mojave using the leased SP tracks. For all intents and purposes, the Santa Fe had finally reached California.

While saber rattling and negotiating at Needles, Santa Fe was quietly building a railroad from Guaymas, Mexico, to a U.S. connection near Nogales, Arizona. Guaymas, a natural harbor, gave ATSF a Pacific port at last. With the Mexican connection at San Diego, Santa Fe also reached California while Huntington was occupied elsewhere.

The Santa Fe, operating as the California Southern, completed its line from San Bernardino through Cajon Pass and connected with the Southern Pacific track at Barstow, CA. With the completion of track over Cajon Pass, Santa Fe finally had access to the Pacific Coast in

Southern California.

Santa Fe gained full control of the SL&SF in 1890, but the overextended ATSF and the SL&SF both found themselves in receivership after the panic of 1893. The western end of the SL&SF was sold to newly formed Santa Fe Pacific Railroad in 1897; in 1899 Santa Fe Pacific, (owned by a revitalized ATSF) negotiated trackage rights with the Southern Pacific over Tehachapi Pass into the San Joaquin Valley and ultimately, Oakland, CA. Santa Fe finally had the bay area as well.

The two railroads entered into talks—Southern Pacific would swap its Mojave/Needles line for Santa Fe's Mexican lines. It seemed to be a good trade for both, with SP getting lots of Mexican railroad and lots of Mexican land in trade for a Santa Fe gateway to Southern California. Huntington signed the deal, but later regretted it, telling friends he had "blinked" when offered the deal. The date was July 15, 1898.

There are other tales as complex and exciting as you've just read, such as when SP's army was held at gunpoint on the California side of the Colorado by the Cavalry from Fort Yuma, Arizona Territory. SP's men

got the soldiers drunk and as soon as the last soldier fell to his knees in an alcoholic stupor, the SP track gangs went into action and built a bridge across the river. The Arizona Territorial governor demanded SP pull up the rails and go back to California, but Washington, D.C., had other ideas. But that's a story for another time.

MODELING HISTORIC STRUCTURES

PACIFIC ELECTRIC DEPOT RECREATED IN HO SCALE

Doug Archer, a member of the Historical and Modeling Committee and expert modeler, has just completed a model of the Pacific Electric Depot at 128 East Commonwealth Avenue in Fullerton, which will be incorporated into a new diorama/Module for display at future Railroad Days and other railfan-based shows around Southern California. The model is built to HO scale (3.5 mm:1 foot) and depicts the station as it looked at the time of abandonment of the P.E. tracks to Fullerton, January 1, 1963.

The P.E. station, built in the Mission Revival style, was opened in December 1918 at a cost to the Pacific Electric of \$10,000 and served the city of Fullerton as the terminus of the PE and later a terminal for the Greyhound Bus Lines. The structure exists today in its original location as the Spadra Restaurant.







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
