Phase I of Window Restoration Project Completed

The large picture windows of Dormitory-Lounge UP6101 are no longer clouded by rain water trapped between the thermal panes of safety glass and the etching of the substrate brought on by caustic soda laced wash water leaking into the window assemblies, all due to the deterioration of the rubber window seals which have, to the best of our knowledge never been replaced since the car was built sixty-nine years ago.

The leakage caused considerable deterioration inside the walls of the cars and the leaks had to be abated before the damage became terminal. When SCRPA received the two ACF lounge cars in 2016 it was immediately clear that the window replacement had to be a top priority, but the cost of renewal was of great concern. A generous gift from Edith and Lee Culp underwrote the rebuilding program and the first window assembly was removed in April 2017, just prior to Railroad Days.

All fifteen window assemblies in the lounge section were systematically removed and disassembled one at a time. The aluminum framing pieces were carefully cleaned removing sixty-nine years' of grime, dried and cracked rubber molding and the remnants of cork liner material. They were polished and set aside while the significant corrosion and rust damage inside the car's walls was repaired and repainted with rust inhibiting paint. Ten of the two-piece glazing sets had to be replaced with new tinted safety glass as the etching was too deep to buff away. The original rubber molding and spacers were no longer manufactured, necessitating the purchase of two custom made dies which were used to extrude enough neoprene seals to restore all the windows in the two ACF lounge cars. Small Bakelite spacers also had to be custom manufactured to stabilize the glass and the new neoprene seals. After all interior mountings were restored and new holes drilled and tapped, the now pristine window assemblies were reinstalled in the cars and fastened with stainless-steel screws to preclude future corrosion problems. The disassembly, restoration and reinstallation of the fifteen picture windows in UP6101's lounge compartment took fourteen months, completing the work September 1, 2018. The lounge windows are now better than new, having received upgraded stainless-steel mounting hardware and updated neoprene seals. The smaller windows in the dormitory section of the car just need to be resealed with new neoprene molding. We won't know the extent of corrosion inside the walls until those windows come out, but they will be dealt with as needed.

The job could not have been completed without the dedicated work of our Railway Operating Committee members, many of whom worked just about every weekend for fourteen months. Whether fighting the biting cold of winter or sweltering in 2018's record breaking summer heatwave, the gentlemen were at the Fullerton Train Museum and kept working, rain or shine.

Window Restoration phase II

Next up for the window crew will be the 13 large windows in Café-Diner-Lounge UP5101. A few of those will need to be reglazed including one that at one time in the car's past was replaced with Plexiglas. As with the 6101, the smaller windows in the diner just need new neoprene window moldings.

2019 SCRPA and Fullerton Train Museum Goals

2019 has plans to be a big year for the Fullerton Train Museum and the SCRPA. Read our goals for the year below:

1. Increase membership and volunteer hours by 35%.
2. Increase major donor funding for projects by \$50,000.
3. Acquire and take delivery of a new passenger car for the museum to be used as a display car for artifacts and a library.
4. Source and install HVAC units in the existing lounge and dining cars, including electricity upgrades.
5. Plan and execute a successful Railroad Days event on May 4 & 5.
6. Open the Museum on the first and third Saturdays of every month and conduct quarterly special events.
7. Install the remaining windows and complete other ROC projects as planned.

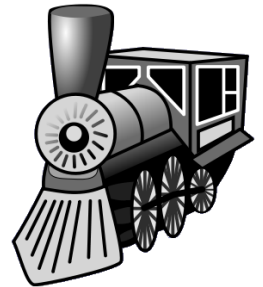
Every Saturday from 9:00 am to 12:00 pm, volunteers are needed to repair and preserve our rail cars.

Railroad Operations Committee (ROC) Update

What's happening with the Railway Operations Committee?

If you have been down by the Fullerton Train Museum any time over the last few months you might get the impression that nothing has been happening. But looks are often deceiving. The window replacement crew has been doing an incredible job of replacing, one at a time, all the larger windows in the UP6101 lounge/dorm car.

Once the large windows were all replaced it was time for the crew to take a break from windows and move on to another project. That new project is the moving of the old white wooden storage shed to about twelve feet west of the new red wooden shed. Over the last several Saturday mornings the crew has had to empty the old shed of all the rail equipment stored in it as well as a lot of scrap metal that would be gotten rid of. Once empty, the shed was slid to its new position. It was raised to be the same floor height as the red shed. Once in the proper position, the rail equipment that we wanted to keep was put back into the shed. It is amazing how much junk we got rid of. The crew then started building a raised platform between the two sheds. Part of the crew used their time to remove the weather-beaten corner and roof fascia pieces from the old shed and replace them with new wood. The door and the fascia around it still have to be removed and replaced, as well as a piece of flashing for over the door; just in case it rains some day.

Over the next couple of Saturdays the platform was leveled to the correct height and the first plywood layer of platform was laid on it. The first layer of plywood was only 3/8ths inch thick and was donated to us. To make the platform ply 3/4 inch thick, for strength, we will have to buy some more 3/8ths inch thick plywood. It took six pieces of plywood to fill the area between the two sheds and the small brick wall and the nearest rail. A seventh piece of plywood was fitted between the front of the door of the red shed and the nearest rail and was attached to the main platform. When finished, one will be able to step out of one shed, walk over a few steps and step right into the other shed.

After the second layer of plywood is installed, the whole platform will be painted with the same decking paint that we used on the ATSF and the SP floors a few years ago. Then a donated 10' X 10' canopy will be secured to the deck for shade for the window crew to use when they get back to the smaller windows in UP6101 and the windows in UP5001.

There is also work being done on the UP3752 caboose. All of the bench tops have been replaced; we are now attempting to remove an interior wall on the south side of the caboose. Once the wall is replaced we will be attaching a wall mounted water container, with a water bottle and a section for ice, which we believe is typical for that era.

Our work party crew consists of about 12 men when everyone comes out at the same time. Everyone must enjoy it; they all come back for more. If anyone wants to join us, Please come down to the museum on the first and/or third Saturday of each month between the hours of 9am and Noon. We can use anyone with any kind of skills, or come down to learn new skills. Or just come down to see what we're doing. Hope to see some new faces!



History & Modeling Committee Update

The History & Modeling Committee has had a busy 2018. Meeting almost every Tuesday evening to build this beautiful HO Gauge model.

Now it needs a home! The SCRPA would like to donate this model to a deserving home where kids can learn to play with model trains and operate them around the mini-city. With hopes that future generations will also want to build models and play with trains.

The model is 8'-4" L x 4'-4" W and stands 4' tall. There are two sets of tracks that travel around homes, an old mill, and a lake. The model comes with all the trains and the power. Just plug it in and go.
